

**MARY LINTOT DOUGHERTY**

Dougherty, 73, of Houston, died July 22, 2023. She received her law degree from Louisiana State University Paul M. Hebert Law Center and was admitted to the

Texas Bar in 2005. Dougherty was also a member of the Louisiana and Baton Rouge bars. She was an estate planning and tax attorney with Kean Miller and then Taylor Porter in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; a partner in Liskow & Lewis in Houston from 2007 to 2019; a frequent speaker at trust and estate law seminars in Louisiana and Florida; and a certified public accountant. Dougherty was a member of the Baton Rouge Estate and Business Planning Council; a member of the State Bar of Texas Real Estate, Probate, and Trust Law Section; and a member of the Order of the Coif at Louisiana State University. She is remembered as brilliant, fiercely independent, and strong-willed. Dougherty is survived by her husband of 20 years, Craig W. Murray; sons, Paul M. Jackson and Chevis M. Jackson; daughter, attorney Jennie J. Miller; brother, Cary M. Dougherty Jr.; sister, Elizabeth C. Dougherty; and four grandchildren.

**IRA DOMNITZ**

Domnitz, 50, of Richmond, died May 22, 2023. He received his law degree from Boston University School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 2002. Domnitz

was also a member of the Massachusetts and U.S. Patent and Trademark Office bars. He was an associate of the Matthews Firm in Houston from 2004 to 2006; an associate of Seyfarth Shaw, later Duane Morris, in Houston from 2006 to 2009; an associate of Winstead in Houston from 2009 to 2011; a partner in Stephens and Domnitz in Houston from 2011 to 2016, a senior associate of Ewing & Jones in Houston from 2016 to 2019, and a partner in Stephens | Domnitz | Meineke in Houston from 2019 to 2022. Domnitz is remembered for drumming in his band, being a panelist and organizer of Comicpalooza, and being an avid gym goer. He is survived by his wife of 23 years,

Rupa Domnitz; son, Rivan Domnitz; and daughter, Natanya Domnitz.

**HOLLYE CARSON FISK**

Fisk, 77, of Dallas, died December 21, 2023. He received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1973. Fisk

was an attorney with McCrea & Fisk in Dallas from 1977 to 1981; an attorney with Greenberg & Fisk in Dallas from 1981 to 1988; and an attorney with Fisk Attorneys, previously Fisk & Fielder, in Dallas from 1988 to 2023. He was certified in construction law by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization, received the 2023 Legend Award from the Dallas Bar Association Construction Law Section, and will posthumously receive the 2024 Pioneer Award from the State Bar of Texas Construction Law Section. Fisk is remembered for being an avid scuba diver and underwater photographer and a dedicated University of Texas Longhorns fan. He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Susan Stubblefield Fisk; sons, attorneys Robert Carson Fisk and David Hollye Fisk; brother, Aubry Blanchard Fisk Jr.; and five grandchildren.

**CHARLES W. THOMASSON**

Thomasson, 93, of Corpus Christi, died December 20, 2023. He received his law degree from Yale Law School and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1957.

Thomasson served in the U.S. Air Force Reserve from 1952 to 1968. He was also a member of the Tennessee Bar. He was a partner in Gary, Thomasson, Hall & Marks in Corpus Christi from 1957 to 2008. Thomasson was president of the Morris L. Lichtenstein Jr. Medical Research Foundation from 2008 to 2023 and was active in the development of Corpus Christi's downtown, museums, and Texas A&M University campus. He is remembered for being an avid racing sailor and manager of yachting events in Corpus Christi and across the country. Thomasson is survived by his wife of 68 years, Willa Parker Thomasson; daughters, Camille Thomasson and Anne Thomasson

Thompson; brothers, David Thomasson and Neill Thomasson; and one grandchild.

**BRYAN W. SCOTT**

Scott, 84, of Moulton, died December 22, 2022. He received his law degree from Baylor University School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1961. Scott was a

partner in Urban, Coolidge, Pennington & Scott and owner of Bryan W. Scott Attorneys at Law. He is remembered for successfully arguing before the 14th Court of Appeals in Houston the case that established the rule of tracing separate property into and back out of marriage (*Horlock v. Horlock*), which is taught in Texas law schools and has been cited in subsequent cases at least 55 times. Scott is survived by his wife of 28 years, Barbara Wolfe; son, Bryan W. Scott Jr.; daughters, Melinda Williams and Mary Kay Scott; and sister, Glennda Cook.

**EDWARD M. YTURRI**

Yturri, 96, of Marble Falls, died August 27, 2023. He received his law degree from the St. Mary's University School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1951. Yturri

served in the U.S. Army from 1945 to 1949, learning to read and write the Japanese language at the University of Pennsylvania before serving in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's counter-intelligence team in occupied Japan. He served in the Army Reserve and Texas National Guard from 1949 to 1973 and the inactive Reserve until 1986. Yturri practiced law in Corpus Christi and surrounding communities in the 1950s and 1960s, served in the Richard Nixon administration as a regional director of the Consumer Products Safety Commission, and was county judge of Burnet County. He is remembered as an avid gardener and world traveler. He is predeceased by his youngest son, James "Jimmy" Yturri, and is survived by his wife of 72 years, Dottie Yturri; sons, attorney David Yturri and Thomas Yturri; daughters, Kate Yturri and Jean Yturri; eight grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren. **TBJ**
