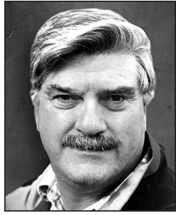

BRADLEY CARSON MILES

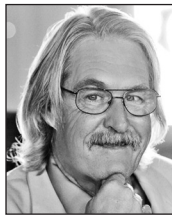
Miles, 84, of San Angelo, died April 5, 2019. He received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law and was admitted to the Texas
