

JORDAN BATTERSBY McDONALD

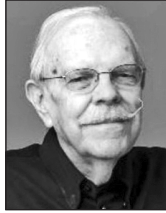
McDonald, 34, of Bastrop, died December 5, 2021. He received his law degree from Baylor Law School and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 2015.

Minniece, 88, of Houston, died January 10, 2022. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1954 to 1961.

Minniece received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1960. He practiced law with the Texas State Securities Board in Austin; McGowan & Magee Monahans; Morris, Termini, Harris & McCanne in Houston; and Organized Security National Bank in Houston from 1973 to 1979; was a consultant to Hydromet Minerals, Laser Systems Holdings, Rocky Mountain Minerals, and Ireland Resource from 1979 to 1990; and was a solo practitioner in Marfa from 1990 to 2000. Minniece is remembered for being widely read and traveled; being active in sports, including sky diving, crew, soaring, tennis, horseback riding, and sailing; and for being a member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity and the Gray Masonic Lodge. He is survived by his wife of 48 years, Glenda B. Minniece; sons John G. Minniece IV and Joseph T. Minniece; daughters Laurie Minniece Schlesinger and Patricia Benington; and five grandchildren.

FRANK WALLACE ELLIOTT JR.

Elliott, 91, of Fort Worth, died September 9, 2021. He served active duty in the U.S. Army from 1951 to 1953 and was in the

reserves from 1953 to 1981. Elliott received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1957. He was a law professor at the University of Texas from 1958 to 1977; a visiting professor of law at the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General law school from 1973 to 1974; a Fulbright Jaworski Professor of Law Dean and professor of law at Texas Tech University from 1977 to 1980; president of the Southwestern Legal Foundation from 1980 to 1986; a partner in Baker, Mills & Glast in 1987; of counsel to Ramirez & Associates from 1987 to 2018; founder, dean, and professor of law at Dallas/Fort Worth School of Law, later Texas Wesleyan School of Law, from 1989 to 1992; and dean emeritus and professor of law at Texas A&M University School of Law from 2013 until his retirement in 2018. Elliott is remembered for being a loyal friend, a diligent scholar, and a devoted and supportive husband. He is survived by his wife of 38 years, Kay; daughter, Lindsey; stepson Brett Hodgson; stepdaughters Kim McConnell and Samantha Germany; and six grandchildren.

HARVEY BAZAMAN

Bazaman, 73, of Galveston, died January 4, 2022. He received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1973. After four years in private practice, Bazaman worked for Galveston County in its newly

formed legal department in 1978, serving as director from 1985 until his retirement in 2013. He was well respected for his integrity and insight, was a man of eclectic tastes, and enjoyed travel and his many hobbies. Bazaman is survived by his brother, Bryan.

Walker, 69, of Houston, died August 5, 2021. He received his law degree from South Texas College of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in

He loved golf; flying, having been a private pilot; and exploring Italy.
